Federal Tax Credits Have Returned!



If you installed high-efficiency equipment in the last year, your customers may be eligible for a tax credit from the U.S. government. The same goes for any high-efficiency installations that you perform in 2016. There are several conditions that must be met to qualify, so we've put together a handy quick-reference guide for our customers to help them understand the program.

What is eligible?

There are four available tax credits that pertain to products sold by Able Distributors.

- 1. 95%+ AFUE Gas-Fired Furnaces: Any gas- or oil-fired furnace with an Annual Fuel Utilization Efficiency rating of 95% or greater qualifies for a federal tax credit of \$150.
- 2. 95%+ AFUE Gas-Fired Boilers: Any gas- or oil-fired boiler with an Annual Fuel Utilization Efficiency rating of 95% or greater qualifies for a federal tax credit of \$150.
- 3. 16+ SEER/13+ EER Central Split Air-Conditioning Condensers: Any split A/C condensers with a SEER rating greater than 16 and an EER rating greater than 13 qualify for a federal tax credit of \$300.
- 4. ECM Blower Motors: Any blower that utilizes 2% or less of a furnace's total energy consumption qualifies for a federal tax credit of \$50.

What are the installation requirements?

These are the additional installation conditions that must be met to qualify for the federal tax credits listed above.

- 1. The equipment must be installed in 2015 or 2016. Installations made in 2015 qualify for a federal credit on their taxes this year. Installations from 2016 will qualify for a tax credit when they file in early 2017.
- 2. Equipment must be installed in an existing home, installations in new construction do **not**
- 3. Equipment must be installed in a primary residence, installation in rental properties do **not**
